*I find Nigerian names interesting. In Nigeria there are three main tribal groups, the Ibo in the South East, the Yoruba in the West and centre, and the Hausa in the north. The first two are mainly Christian, the Hausa mainly Muslim. Each has a different language. Why I love the names is because of particular phrases that occur in them.

For the lbo, the name for God is "Chukwu." In Ibo many names include the name of God in some form. It is similar with the Yoruba – their name for God is Olu, and often found in names as with this Bishop whose name is translated as "God Is With Me". In English, Nigerian names will often mean things such as "God's gift," or "Blessing of God." I quite like the idea of being called something like "Blessing of God." It is much better than Leslie, which apparently comes from Gaelic and means "Garden of Holly!"
