VERY advanced noticed – Our Christmas Fair this year will be on Saturday 24th November.

In church on a Sunday, near the choir pews, we have a pot with a number of metal pegs attached to pictures of butterflies. On a Thursday morning at our midweek Eucharist, we also have the pot available. Why? Well, it is simple – we believe that as a church we should offer people the opportunity to receive special prayer, perhaps for healing, or for strength facing a difficult time, or for comfort when sad, or for prayer to help someone who is struggling. That is what these butterflies are about!

If you would like special prayer on a Sunday, then on the way to receiving communion collect one of them and take it to the communion rail. On a Thursday morning just hold on to it! The person presiding at the communion will then lay hands on you and pray for you, before giving you the bread. We won't ask what you want prayer for, or tell you what you should do – we will pray for you as inspired by the Holy Spirit. Of course, if you want to talk over things, the Rector is always happy to listen! Please remember to put the butterfly back in the pot on the way back to your seat.
